


3 WHAT IS A DOCTOR OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE?

From their first days in medical school, Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine (DOs) are trained to have a whole-person approach to patient care and focus efforts on health promotion and disease prevention. DOs also learn Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine (OMM), which can sometimes be used as an alternative to more aggressive treatments and pharmaceuticals. As fully licensed, board-certified physicians, DOs can be found practicing medicine in all specialties.







Anatomy education at Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine is greatly enhanced by a newly-renovated 2,225 sq. ft. gross anatomy lab, that features dissection tables, digital anatomy workstations, scrubs stations, and sizable storage space for instructional models and anatomical specimens.
